WORLD MISSION TODAY

As many of you know, Ginnie and I not only served as PC(USA) missionaries we were both raised on the mission field – Ginnie in Brazil and me in the Congo. So it will come as no surprise that we have a deep appreciation for the efforts of those who continue to represent the PC(USA) in other countries and cultures.

The legacy of our missionary efforts has born incredible fruit. Many of the churches that were planted by PC(USA) missionaries all over the world are now larger in number than our denomination – some even larger than when we were at our numerical peak as an American denomination. Some of these sister churches have sent missionaries to the United States to work both among immigrants from their own countries and among peoples from all over the world who now live here.

Even as these sister churches have come into their own there is still good reasons for us to work in partnership in the sharing of personnel and resources. Our experiences with Christians from other nations and cultures reminds us that the Gospel of Jesus Christ is larger than we can imagine. Our ways of being and doing church are sometimes challenged by how sisters and brothers are and do church in their contexts. Their efforts to determine what parts of their culture are compatible with the Gospel and which are not helps us to see our cultures in a new light as well. Their ways of expressing the Gospel to people in their context helps us to find new language with which to share the Gospel in our contexts. We can be pleased that our sisters and brothers report that they also appreciate these same things about the relationships we enjoy with them.

This – and much more – is experienced by the many individuals and groups who visit to learn and to share faith with the members of our sister churches around the world. The ability of all of us to enter more fully into this sharing of faith and mutual encouragement in the Gospel is one of the blessings of our modern, technological world with faster telecommunications and safer and less expensive travel than ever before. However what brings these experiences from a casual mission-tourism to real encounters of faith and life is the presence of long-term mission partners who have learned languages, studied histories, absorbed cultures, and lived, worked, and worshiped with our partners.

In recent years the decline of the membership of our beloved PC(USA) and the increase in spending on locally directed ministries has drastically reduced the capacity of Presbyterian World Mission to send mission coworkers around the world. Each year our partners request far more missionaries that we are able to send. In the next year or two we may in fact be compelled to recall some of these people who have spend years and decades become the representatives that we need around the world.

What can we do about this? How can we avoid losing the skills and experiences that this dedicated group of people bring to our common ministry for Christ? Here are a couple of ideas.

Support Presbyterian World Mission by supporting the **Presbyterian Mission Agency**. The single largest part of the General Assembly Mission Agency goes to World Mission. As many congregations and members have reduced their giving to “the General Assembly” in reaction to decisions taken by those who gathered at the General Assembly meeting, the end result is that the very parts of the church that we hold dearest have been the hardest hit by our decreased funding.

Pray that God will continue to raise up men and women who are called to share the Gospel with and among the peoples of the world so that all of us together can worship and praise one Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Mission & Outreach Awards Grants to Three Churches

Presbytery's Committee for Missions and Outreach congratulates the three recipients of 2015 mission grants.

Oak Plain Presbyterian Church received \$1000 for their young adult mission scholarship fund. This year's scholarship recipient is Jenny Ricci who will be serving with CRU this summer in Southeast Asia.

First Presbyterian Church, Dunn received \$900 to help send three folks to Clean Water University in October. Clean Water University is the training program of Living Waters for the World (<http://www.livingwatersfortheworld.org/cwuindex.php>).

**PILOT CERTIFICATE IN MISSIONAL TRANSFORMATION
COACHING**

Nine pastors in the presbytery have begun a year-plus long training process to become certified as Missional Transformation Coaches. They will take six courses and a coaching practicum, read a number of books, gather in day-long sessions, work in small teams on simulated coaching projects, and complete homework assignments via the internet.

The purpose of this pilot project is to provide the Presbytery of Coastal Carolina with long-term, home-grown human resources for supporting congregational vitality in ministry and mission. These pastors will help expand the Presbytery's capacity for helping congregations who commit themselves to discerning fresh vision from God and following it with faithful outcomes. The Committee for Church Revitalization and Transformation is sponsoring this project, which is being led by our Missional Transformation Coaches Beverly and George Thompson.

Clif Christopher in his book, *Not Your Parent's Offering Plate*, encourages pastors to write 10 thank you notes a week to members of their congregations. Hearing Clif's message at a seminar, a pastor I know, took his advice and began writing notes. She thanked members for teaching Sunday school, singing in the choir, serving food at a breakfast event, serving as liturgist, their stewardship pledge. These notes were simple but personal. The next fall during the stewardship campaign, this pastor noticed a significant increase in the pledges and participation.

While she can't prove a direct correlation between the notes and the increase in generosity, it's obvious that generosity begets generosity. Saying thank you is an important part of ministry.
