In college I majored in English, Secondary Education, and Special Education and was awarded a teaching internship at the University of Arkansas in English. I was pursuing my PhD there when I received a job teaching English, Drama, and Technical Report Writing at Madisonville Community College, a part of the University of Kentucky. It was there that I became Chair of the Humanities Division and developed an interest in Higher Education Administration. I enrolled in Vanderbilt University's weekend program for college administration and while working on my doctorate became academic dean for Hazard Community College still within the University of Kentucky system.

It was while I was serving as dean that God called me to the ministry, and to be honest, I did not want to go. I was on a fast track in my career and my goal of becoming a college president. And besides, it hadn't been that long since women in our denomination could be ordained as Ministers of Word and Sacrament. Then one day, as I was driving, I realized that the most important thing in my life was my relationship with God, and if this was what the Lord wanted, it was what I wanted too.
