The Rev. Dr. Alice Ridgill currently serves as Associate General Presbyter of Charlotte Presbytery and as a Chaplain in the United States Air Force Reserve where she holds the rank of Captain. Prior to her current work, she served as the organizing and installed pastor of New Faith Presbyterian Church, a congregation that began as a new worshiping community in 2010. She has also served as pastor of Washington Street Presbyterian Church, adjunct professor of pastoral care for Erskine Theological Seminary, and campus pastor of Thornwell, a home and ministry for children in covenant relationship with the churches in South Carolina, Georgia, and Florida of the PC(USA) Synod of South Atlantic. Dr. Ridgill's past service to the larger church includes: Chair of the Committee on Representation for the Synod of South Atlantic, Presbyterians Caring for Chaplains and Military Personnel Board of Directors, and the Presbyterian Mission Agency Board of Directors. Dr. Ridgill holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Presbyterian College, a Master of Divinity and Doctor of Ministry degree from Erskine Theological Seminary, a Certificate in Executive Leadership from McCormick Theological Seminary, and an MBA from Louisiana State University (Shreveport). She is the author of Maximizing the Meantime: Feasting on God in Times of Famine, an inspirational book written to assist readers with navigating the unpredictable and uncomfortable interim between now and next.

1. Investigating Committee for Disciplinary Matters

In accordance with the Book of Order (D-10.0000), I must report to you that I have received a written and signed allegation. The written statement of allegation was submitted to the stated clerk of The Presbytery of New Hope. However, The Presbytery of Coastal Carolina has jurisdiction over the subject of the allegation. The moderator of presbytery has formed an Investigating Committee and members have been trained. They work cooperatively with members appointed by the Presbytery of New Hope.

2. Civil Summons

I also report that the Presbytery of Coastal Carolina has been named in a civil summons along with a congregation in our jurisdiction and the Boy Scouts of America. The Executive Board of Mission Cabinet, the Board of Directors for the Corporation, has been notified. We have retained a lawyer.

We continue to be in partnership with our sibling in Christ from Tabasco. Our partnership has been impacted by this global pandemic. We have been notified of those from Tabasco that served in the leadership and have joined the church triumphant during this time. Their names are listed below. Let us pray for our sister presbytery, the lives lost, and their new leaders. Pastor Jose Antonio Alvarez Peralta is now the president of El Presbiterio del Golfo de Mexico and the head of their Partnership Committee.

At the March 6, 2021 meeting of the Presbytery of Coastal Carolina an Administrative Commission was elected to assist the Session and congregation of Bethel Presbyterian Church, Beulaville, North Carolina. Members of the Administrative Commission are Ruling Elder Kaye Bledsoe, Teaching Elder Phil Gladden and Ruling Elder Matlynn Yeoman.

Rev. Jerrod Lowry, General Presbyter/Stated Clerk met with the members of the Administrative Commission on March 16, 2021 to train us on the duties and responsibilities of the commission.

On March 22, 2021, the Administrative Commission held its organizational meeting. Matlynn Yeoman was elected Chair and Kaye Bledsoe was elected Clerk. We reviewed the report from the Committee on Inquiry and the request from the Session at Bethel to have an Administrative Commission assigned to the church. Preparation was done for a meeting with the former members of Session.

The first meeting of the Administrative Commission with the former members of Session (Elders Marilyn Futrell, Marsha Pierson, Rebecca Southerland) was held on April 12, 2021. A series of questions were asked. It was determined that there are about twenty members on the roll, of which about a dozen were older or homebound. The membership has declined due to death, young adults moving away and the natural effects of aging. There are no mission activities or outreach. The last members of Session were no longer willing to serve and there was no one willing to serve as elders. Some of those who attend regularly are not members, but family members with membership at other churches. The church has not had consistent pastoral leadership for twenty years. They want to continue to worship at their church. They do not want the church to close. They indicated that they wanted help from the Presbytery to revitalize the church.

The Administrative Commission met with the congregation on May 2, 2021. Twelve members were in attendance. The purpose of the administrative commission was explained, and a series of questions were asked to gain insight into their vision for the church. Options for the church were presented. The options include merger with other congregations, being a part of a multicongregation cluster, to grow to a size that can support a full-time pastor, secure a commissioned ruling elder or supply pastor, become a satellite of another church, or close the church. They were asked to begin a period of discernment to determine God's plan for the future of their congregation. The former members of session will be collecting feedback from this meeting to be shared with the administrative commission.

The Administrative Commission met with the former members of Session on May 11, 2021 to obtain feedback from the May 2nd meeting. We learned that there had been two splits in the church. One involved a possible merger with Beulaville and Chinquapin and the merged congregation meeting at Beulaville. The other involved a previous minister. The congregation still wants to continue worshiping at Bethel.

The former members of Session met with the congregation on June 6, 2021. The Administrative Commission met with them on June 17, 2021 to get feedback from that meeting. Three ruling elders (Ann Hatcher, Ann Hunter and Marsha Pierson) are willing to serve on Session, but none are willing to serve as Clerk. The options presented during the May 2, 2021 congregation meeting were discussed. None of the options were feasible to the congregation. Again, it was pointed out that the congregation wishes to remain at Bethel. The Administrative Commission will assist them in obtaining more consistency in the pastoral voices in the church. The former members of Session will meet with the congregation to discuss the option of becoming a satellite chapel with another church.

The Administrative Commission met with the former members of Session on July 29, 2021, to get feedback from the congregation meeting to discuss the satellite option. There was little feedback. Members of the Administrative Commission will meet with the congregation to further discuss the satellite option. Names of potential supply pastors were given to them to contact.

On August 8, 2021, representatives from the Administrative Commission met with the congregation to discuss the option of the church becoming a satellite site for another church. At the end of the discussion an informal survey was conducted to determine their interest in becoming a satellite. Thirteen were opposed to the satellite option and two were in favor of the satellite option. They still expressed the desire to keep the church open.

Following the August 8th meeting, the former members of Session indicated that they had three members (Ruling Elders Ann Hatcher, Marilyn Futrell and Marsha Pierson) willing to serve on Session with Marilyn Futrell agreeing to serve as Clerk.

A congregation meeting was held on September 26 with the sole purpose of presenting a slate of officers for the Session of Bethel Presbyterian Church. Rev. David Vanderbilt served as Moderator. The congregation approved the slate of Ruling Elders Marilyn Futrell, Ann Hatcher and Marsha Pierson to serve as the Session of Bethel Presbyterian Church and Marilyn Futrell to serve as Clerk of Session.

The Administrative Commission scheduled a meeting for October 31, 2021, to train and examine the newly elected members of Session. The elders were given an extensive list of materials to review prior to October 31, 2021. The administrative commission conducted in person training. Ruling Elders Marilyn Futrell and Ann Hatcher were given the opportunity to ask questions about the reading material. Ruling Elders present were examined and deemed ready for installation.

On November 1, 2021, Ruling Elder Marsha Pierson informed the Administrative Commission that she would not be able to serve on Session. The former members of Session were also informed. The administrative Commission reminded them that without another person willing to serve on Session, the Commission would have to move forward with the process of closing the church.

The former members of Session informed the Administrative Commission that Ruling Elder Ann Hunter was willing to serve on Session. Her training and examination were scheduled for November 19, 2021.

The training and examination of Ann Hunter was deemed satisfactory. The election of Ann Hunter to Session was added to the agenda for the November 21, 2021, congregation meeting.

On November 21, 2021, the Administrative Commission held its last Congregation Meeting at Bethel Presbyterian Church with Rev. David Vanderbilt serving as Moderator. Ruling Elder Ann Hunter was nominated to serve on the Session. She was unanimously approved by the Congregation. With her election, the three Ruling Elders (Marilyn Futrell, Ann Hatcher and Ann Hunter) were installed as the Session of Bethel Presbyterian Church. The church will remain open under the leadership of the Session.

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Presbytery of Coastal Carolina Amendment to Manual of Administrative Operations March 5, 2022

The Presbytery of Coastal Carolina has been meeting virtually since March 8, 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Executive Board in consultation with the advisory opinion offered by Constitutional Services of the PC(USA) authorized such meetings.

I move the Presbytery of Coastal Carolina amend the Manual of Administrative Operations with the following language and policy.

"The Presbytery of Coastal Carolina authorizes all meetings, stated and special, of the Presbytery, as well as meetings of administrative units of the Presbytery to be conducted by electronic means. Electronic meetings shall provide the ability to discuss, deliberate, discern the will of God, and vote on business items. The quorum for stated meetings and special meetings that gather solely by electronic means or incorporate participants using electronic means in a hybrid model shall be consistent with the presbytery and community rule regarding quorum.

The following rules regarding electronic meetings and digital communications are adopted for all presbytery committees, commissions, task groups, teams, and meetings.

- 1) Mission Cabinet or the Executive Board of Mission Cabinet may approve that the full presbytery meet by electronic means. Community Gatherings may meet by electronic means as approved by the Community Steering Team or chair of the Community Steering Team.
- 2) Except where specifically prohibited, meetings of commissions, committees, teams, and task forces may be conducted as an electronic meeting, in whole or in part, without the participants being physically present in the same room. The chair is authorized to call the meeting electronically, or modify a previously set meeting to an electronic meeting, provided amply time and notice is given to members.
- 3) Electronic meetings may be conducted via a phone conference call platform for voice communication or by video conference platform for voice and visual communication.
- 4) Regardless of the platform, in each meeting those present shall have the opportunity to seek recognition and assignment of the floor, interrupt motions (points of order, appeals from the ruling of the chair, etc.), motion processing, and voting. The chair and clerk will strive for a best practices for the size of the group and platform used. All participants must have the opportunity for simultaneous communication.
- 5) Commissions, committees and teams, and task forces of Presbytery may take action required or permitted to be taken at a meeting with like effect between meetings of the entity, provided that every member is contacted either in person or via email and no member objects. If contacted via email, verification must consist of an email reply stating "no objection," or words to that effect. If any member objects or wishes to have discussion on the motion, then a special face-to-face or electronic meeting is required to take the action. Discussion via email in lieu of a meeting is not sufficient. Action via email, if taken, shall be recorded in the minutes of the next meeting of the entity as an action taken by unanimous consent between meetings in accordance with the rules.

Electronic meetings should be conducted, rather than email, in order for a group to approve any actions that will be reported to the presbytery.

The Finance and Property Committee (the "Committee") based upon in-depth study, faithful deliberation, and discussions with The Bridge Presbyterian Church, Inc. Leadership and Presbyterian Church (USA) Investment and Loan Program, Inc. requests that:

The **Presbytery of Coastal Carolina, Inc.** enthusiastically endorses the faith and financial commitment of The Bridge Presbyterian Church, Inc. congregation in their endeavor purchase an existing church property at 1444 Lanvale Rd, Leland, NC

Further, to facilitate the financing of the Property, The Presbytery of Coastal Carolina, Inc. President and Secretary are authorized and directed to sign the GUARANTY AGREEMENT in the maximum amount of \$430,000 by and between the Presbytery of Coastal Carolina, Inc. (the "Guarantor") and the Presbyterian Church (USA) Investment and Loan Program, Inc. (the "Lender"). This motion is contingent upon:

The receipt of the **GUARANTY AGREEMENT** that is satisfactory to the **Committee**.

AND the receipt of the executed **Note Agreement** by and between **The Bridge Presbyterian Church, Inc** (the "**Borrower**") and the **Lender** that is satisfactory to the **Committee** and includes the terms similar to the following:

- Loan amount \$430,000
- Interest rate 2%, fixed for 5 years. The rate will always be 1% below the published rate by virtue of the Bridge being a new start-up congregation.
- Payment / amortization term 20 years
- Monthly payment \$2,175.30
- Prepayment option allows early prepayment without penalty

AND, receipt of an agreement with the **Borrower** that during the entire term of this loan the Borrower (a) will maintain general liability and "all hazard" property insurance that fully insures the Worship Center (b) and will provide to the Committee quarterly financial information as to its operations with comparison to the annual session adopted budget.

AND, receipt of an agreement with the **Borrower** that during the entire term of the loan the **Guarantor** and **Borrower** agree to fully cooperate in the full release of the **Guarantor** by the **Lender** or through the refinancing of the loan with an alternative source under reasonably similar terms.

LIMITED GUARANTY AGREEMENT - Key terms:

- **Full loan guaranty -** Lender may collect from the Guarantor (in some cases, exclusively), if the loan obligation is unpaid at any time during the entire loan term...full release in the case of foreclosure
- Lender first priority Lender has the first priority in the case of bankruptcy
- **Monitoring requirement -** Guarantor is required to advise the Lender of any events adversely affecting the Borrower


Financial Considerations for the Bridge

- Our operating budget deficits for 2020 and 2021 averaged \$30,000.
 - The rent that we pay for the facility currently is over \$5,043 per month and expected to grow by at least 3% annually.

- We anticipate the debt service on the loan of \$430,000 to be \$2,175 per month, a savings of \$2,869 (58%) per month.
- The projected deficit to the operating budget for 2022 if the church continues to lease the current location is greater than \$45,000. (The aforementioned financial deficits have been largely offset by returns from investments.)
- While a driving reason for the purchase of the new property is financial, the Leadership of the Bridge believes that our outreach and ministry to the area will be enhanced by the purchase of the new property which is ideally located along a major thoroughfare in a rapidly growing area of Leland. The location is near the elementary, middle and high school in an area where developers will soon be building large new subdivisions."
- "The lack of a permanent facility and property has severely limited the mission and ministry of the bridge Presbyterian Church. The vision for the future property includes hosting scout troops, outdoor worship services, community barbeque contests, Vacation Bible Schools and community music concerts. Together the building and property are envisioned to be a 'hub' for community activity in Leland and Belville."

Sanctuary / Worship Center Proposed Sanctuary Building - constructed in 1994, single story, seating capacity of 200.





Building - The Property consists of approximately 3.25 acres with two additional buildings. The main worship center building consists of approximately 4,000 square feet in total. The sanctuary can accommodate approximately 200 worshipers on 20 pews. There are 5 additional rooms used as offices, children's center, pastor's office, church business office and media control room.

The modular building is approximately 1,000 square feet with one restroom and the remainder of the space open. Additionally, there is a partially completed building that the vision is to eventually complete and dedicate to our scout troop(s).

A small storage shed will be retained for onsite storage if any outdoor equipment, playground and other items

Building cost - The purchase price of the facility is \$450,000. The site consists of the building shown, a modular building to be used as a fellowship hall and gathering venue for the congregation, Ministry partners such as a Scout troop and AA and AI Anon

Insurance – Throughout the loan term The Bridge Presbyterian Church will maintain general liability and "all hazard" property insurance equal to the new building replacement value.

STAFF RELATED EXPENSE REIMBURSEMENT POLICY FOR THE PRESBYTERY OF COASTAL CAROLINA January 27, 2022

Staff related expense reimbursement policy is a policy created by the Finance and Property Committee to give guidance to staff/ministers on the procedure of repayment to employees/Ministers for any out-of-pocket expenses that they have incurred on behalf of Presbytery of Coastal Carolina. This expense reimbursement policy detail when and how employees will be repaid for company expenses and outline the proper procedure for reimbursement.

The Committee recommends the following Policy to the Presbytery to create a Policy for Staff Related Expense Reimbursement.

Guidelines for Staff Related Expense Reimbursement.

STAFF RELATED EXPENSE REIMBURSEMENT POLICY FOR THE PRESBYTERY OF COASTAL CAROLINA

In accordance with IRS regulations 1.162-17 and 1.274-5(f), the Presbytery of Coastal Carolina hereby establishes a reimbursement policy for all ministers and other employees with the following terms and conditions:

- 1. The Presbytery will reimburse within 60 days only reasonable ministry/staffrelated business expenses incurred by a minister or employee. Subject to budget limitations, such expenses will include:
 - a. Business (ministry/staff) use of automobile, using the standard IRS mileage rate for the current year.
 - b. Business (ministry/staff) related travel away from home including transportation, lodging and meals on overnight trips.
 - c. Cell phone for ministers/staff whose ministry/staff responsibilities require being available by phone beyond normal office hours. Only the minister's/staff phone expense is paid phones for the family are not to be included as a business expense.
 - d. Convention and conference expenses
 - e. Educational expenses, if otherwise qualified as an itemized deduction
 - f. Subscriptions, books and tapes, if related to ministry or employment
 - g. Entertainment/hospitality expenses if business (ministry) connection requirement is met
- 2. The minister or employee will account for each allowable expense in writing within 60 days. Travel expense documentation will include total business/ministry miles for each day with a description of the purpose. Documentation for other ministry related expenses the Presbytery agrees to cover will include the date, amount, and a description adequate to identify the business/ministry relationship of each expense. Appropriate receipts should accompany the documentation.

- 3. The minister or employee will return advances that exceed actual business expenses within 30 days.
- 4. Under this accountable arrangement the Presbytery will not report reimbursed amounts as taxable income on the minister's or employee's Form W-2. The minister or employee should not report reimbursed amounts as income on Form 1040.

COMMUNITY RELATED EXPENSE REIMBURSEMENT POLICY FOR THE PRESBYTERY OF COASTAL CAROLINA

- 1. Mission Coordinators should not submit reimbursements for their communities. These requests must come from the Chair and the minutes of the steering team should be attached.
- 2. Ensure that the request is valid. Example No honorarium is required for PCUSA or SYNOD staff to present on topics that are job related.

The Presbytery of Coastal Carolina Inc. Budget and Finance Committee Report to the Presbytery March 5th, 2022

At the end of December 2021, expenses exceeded revenue by (\$66,975.46) for the calendar year.

Staff related expense reimbursement policy is a policy created by the Finance and Property Committee to give guidance to staff/ministers on the procedure of repayment to employees/Ministers for any out-of-pocket expenses that they have incurred on behalf of Presbytery of Coastal Carolina. This expense reimbursement policy detail when and how employees will be repaid for company expenses and outline the proper procedure for reimbursement. This will be an amendment to the Personnel Handbook.

Information Items:

- 4. Freedom East PC update. They received their loan from PILP. According to the January 2022 statement they are up to date on their payment. They also have adequate insurance for their sanctuary and new building.
- 5. Update on Southport PC. According to the January 2022 statement they are up to date on their payment. They also have insurance; however, the insurance does not seem adequate. The church administrator was informed, and they will be reviewing their policy.
- 6. Update on Primera Iglesia Presbiteriana De Fayetteville They are now incorporated. They have opened their bank account and the Presbytery is no longer handling their payroll.
- 7. Approved Christmas bonuses for staff.
- 8. Raise will be effective January 1, 2022. For 2022 the raise for the General Presbyter/Stated Clerk and Treasurer will be 3.4% and all other employees 0.7%. The reverse was in effect for raise in 2021.

- 9. Emmanuel Manse and Lot Adverse possession of property. All deeds were transferred correctly and successfully.
- 10. The new sign is pending variance approval by the Town of Elizabethtown. Total cost of new sign is \$2946.30.
- 11. The office parking lot was repainted with parking signs and handicap signs. This has never been done since 1992. The cost was \$1850.
- 12. The water damages to the ceilings caused by the roof prior to replacement has been completed. The cost was \$9500.
- 13. The lights are in the processed of being converted to LED. This will save on our utility bill. Also, over 20 light fixtures of the 87 fixtures in the building were not working. Job started but not completed yet.
- 14. There is a decline/downward spiral over the years with the giving of Shared Mission and Per Capita.

The Presbytery of Coastal Carolina Church Dissolution/Dismissal Policy First Reading March 5, 2022

Rationale:

The members of the committee developing this recommendation explored many options for the use of funds acquired through the dissolution or dismissal of churches within Coastal Carolina Presbytery. As these funds are received because of the loss of one of our churches, we believe that the vast majority of the funds should be viewed as a means to support the continuing presence and new development of other churches, and to support the broader goals of presbytery, rather than viewed as discretionary funds to be used by the dissolved/dismissed church to support its individual goals. Acts 2:44 was in mind: *And all who believed were together and had all things in common*. We realize that, especially in the case of a dissolved church, there are often long, deep, and emotional commitments to local ministries; therefore, the policy does allow the dissolved/dismissed church to recommend designations for up to 20% of funds. However, the majority of funds—70%--is set aside for church development and redevelopment, and 10% is set aside to fund presbytery's ongoing goals through its operating budget--in recognition that the loss of a church usually causes a decline in annual contributions to presbytery.

<u>Proposed Guidelines for Distribution of Funds received</u> from the Dissolution/Dismissal of Churches

The Committee recommends the following Policy for the distribution of any funds received by the Presbytery after a congregation has been dissolved or dismissed.

1. 70% to Church Development and redevelopment/revitalization funds.

Intended to promote new church development opportunities, new worshipping communities, and the redevelopment of existing congregations and ministries that are purposefully pursing plans designed to encourage and enhance vitality and growth.

Areas of interest may include, but are not limited to:

- a) Establishment of new churches
- b) African American and Hispanic church development and resources
- c) CRE grants to those pursuing church service in the presbytery.
- d) Satellite churches (under the leadership of a larger church) to reach new communities
- e) Direct grants for physical assets that would encourage/enhance vitality and growth (i.e.: fellowship hall or education wing expansions)
- f) Established churches that need additional resources (i.e., people funding, youth minister) to spark internal growth and vitality.

2. 10% to the PCC Contingency Fund/ Operating Fund.

Intended to help support the total ongoing presbytery ministry funded by the annual Operating Budget. This may cover the loss of funds that have resulted due to the lack of future annual "Fair Share" contributions from the dissolved/dismissed congregation.

3. 20% to Previously approved Presbytery Designated Funds/Presbytery Mission Commitments.

Intended to give dissolved churches the opportunity to express their desire to support specific areas of ministry within the presbytery. Recommendations would be made to Mission Cabinet by the dissolved church for the designation of those funds toward areas already approved by Presbytery. In the case where the dissolved church indicates no preference, or in the case of a dismissed church, the Mission Cabinet will determine the distribution of these funds.

Strategic Planning and Organizational Review Report to Presbytery 3-5-2022

SPOR recommends the following amendments to the Manual of Administrative Operations: (submitted for first reading, will be voted on at the October Presbytery meeting)

1. Disband the Stewardship Development Committee.

Rationale: Nominations reported difficulty finding volunteers to serve on this committee over several years. Should presbytery approve to amend the Manual of Administrative Operations and eliminate this committee, the work of encouraging the presbytery to be good stewards of God's resources will continue to be the responsibility of the Mission Cabinet. This committee can be reformulated if Mission Cabinet wants to pursue these approaches in the future.

2. Committee on Representation shall have members that represent the three missional communities. The Committee shall meet concurrently with the Committee on Nominations at least twice a year.

Rationale: The current required membership is six. Fewer members can adequately represent the three communities. The Committee is a valuable resource for Nominations. Consistent with G3.0103, the Committee on Representation should not be merged with another committee, but rather should meet with the Committee on Nominations twice a year.

<u>Administrative Commission for Teachey Presbyterian Church Report</u> Recommendation for Distribution of Funds from Sale of the Teachey Manse

Prior to being disbanded, the congregation of Teachey Presbyterian Church met and discussed the distribution of their property after they ceased to exist. The following reflects their sentiments and is endorsed by the Administrative Commission of the Presbytery of Coastal Carolina for the Teachey Presbyterian Church. The Teachey Congregation remained completely co-operative with the commission and remained steadfast in their support of our Presbytery and our denomination. One thing that stands out is their level of trust in the process and in the Presbytery.

The congregation had hoped that the manse would sale for considerably more than it was sold. There were numerous repairs and updating which would be required to make it livable. The manse was sold "as is." This recommendation represents a proportionate distribution of the mission outreach that the congregation had hoped to accomplish.

1) Friends of Kirkwood

\$10,000

The Teachey Church had maintained support and a strong interest in Camp Kirkwood since its founding and wished to do what they could to further its ministry.

2) Rockfish PCUSA Cemetery Fund

10,000

Teachey Presbyterian did not have a cemetery of its own, but many of the members were buried in the Cemetery of their sister church Rockfish Presbyterian Church which is under five miles away from Rockfish Presbyterian Church. Over the years they worked together and at times, shared ministers.

3) Food Pantry (Wallace Presbyterian Church)

5.000

Members of the Teachy Presbyterian Church supported the local food pantry and wanted to continue that support.

4) Wallace Presbyterian Church

5,000

Some of the former members continue their membership in the Wallace Presbyterian Church and are active in the choir.

5) Union Presbyterian Theological Seminary

10,000

Teachy had a member who was going to school at Union when he was killed while serving in the military. They considered supporting Union Presbyterian Seminary in Richmond one of their missions.

6) Edgar J Wells Scholarship Fund

10,000

(James Sprunt Community College)

Edgar J Wells was a leader of leaders in the Presbyterian Church. He served as secretary of the area Presbyterian Men's group which met monthly for decades. His leadership, the respect he received from the Men of the Church and his influence was very important to not only the Teachy Presbyterian Church but to the cadre of Presbyterian Churches who formed a close connection through their monthly dinners together. He was a life long educator and upon his death the Teachy Presbyterian Church established a Scholarship in his honor at the local community college.

Projects focus on advocacy; youth-led initiatives; skills development; farming; disabilities; immigration/refugee issues and capacity building. Through your gifts to One Great Hour of Sharing, projects in economically poor communities around the world have had an opportunity to develop solutions to their own challenges.

The Presbyterian Committee on the Self-Development of People has been financially supported by the annual One Great Hour of Sharing, receiving approximately one-third of the receipts from this special offering. The remainder of the One Great Hour of Sharing offering is divided with Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) and Presbyterian Hunger Program (PHP).

14 | Group of Women of Value, S.A., Panama City, Panama

This project is a catering service that provides high-quality products at affordable prices. The project also provides employment and training to group members, thus helping to provide an income and improve their standard of living. Additional funds were awarded to this group of women to buy a Food truck to allow them to continue their services in times of COVID-19.

15 | Goat Herd Expansion, Tuscaloosa, Alabama

The project involves expanding the raising and selling of goats, which helps get them a better price at market and increase the group's income.

16 | Craft Art and Beauty, Las Tablas, Panama

This project is comprised of a group of artisans who partnered to create a workshop and a warehouse for the preparation and sale of traditional Panamanian clothing. Project members seek to create a workplace for craftswomen and a selling site for handicrafts, which will also be a location where people can find their traditional garments and information about their traditions and customs. The group is also dedicated to training new generations and passing on their traditions as well as to improving their incomes and thereby creating a better quality of life.

This project is a multi-ethnic farmer's cooperative growing fresh vegetables to sell to the public as well as grocers in East New Orleans. The cooperative members share equally in the work, liability and distribution of profits. The grant assists the cooperative by creating sustainable income for the members through sustainable agriculture. Daniel Nguyen of the VEGGI Farmers Cooperative said, "With funding from SDOP, VEGGI Farmers Cooperative will be able to continue our mission of providing jobs to community members through urban farming and increasing local, healthy food access. The funds will also allow us to complete several projects on our site, including a processing facility, and help us buy seeds to plant for the coming year."

The following has been submitted to the stated clerk in advance of the March 5th stated presbytery meeting as an amendment to the motion from Mission Cabinet (pages 18 &19 of the advanced packet) that would amend the Manual of Administrative Operations to allow for virtual meetings.

"I move we strike item #5 in the Proposed amendment to the Manual of Administrative Operations and add the following:

[language to be struck]

5) Commissions, committees and teams, and task forces of Presbytery may take action required or permitted to be taken at a meeting with like effect between meetings of the entity, provided that every member is contacted either in person or via email and no member objects. If contacted via email, verification must consist of an email reply stating "no objection," or words to that effect. If any member objects or wishes to have discussion on the motion, then a special face to face or electronic meeting is required to take the action. Discussion via email in lieu of a meeting is not sufficient. Action via email, if taken, shall be recorded in the minutes of the next meeting of the entity as an action taken by unanimous consent between meetings in accordance with the rules. Electronic meetings should be conducted, rather than email, in order for a group to approve any actions that will be reported to the presbytery.

[language to be added]

- 5) Votes may be conducted by email according to these guidelines:
 - A. The matter for consideration is routine business and normally would be approved without objection.
 - B. Every member of the group is included in the email communication or polled by phone.
 - C. The email communicates a deadline for reply of not less than 2 days and not more than 5
 - D. If any member raises objections, the email voting is void and a meeting must be called to hear the concerns prior to voting. Questions may or may not constitute objections per the discretion of the chair. Discussion via email in lieu of a meeting is not sufficient.
 - E. The chairperson shall email the results of the vote back to the committee declaring the motion passed or the need for a meeting. A majority is defined based upon the membership of the committee.
 - F. If a matter is approved by email, it shall be recorded in the minutes of the next meeting as having been approved by common consent in an email poll.
 - G. If a group is considering a matter that will require further action by the Presbytery or a Community Gathering, the vote of the group may not be taken by email.
